

Majority of Maine's Small Businesses Will Be Exempted from New Recycling Law

The Maine Legislature has shown support for a type of law called Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR) for Packaging that will make Maine's municipal recycling programs more cost-effective and resilient to change.

When fully implemented, this proven solution is projected to save Maine taxpayers \$16-17 million annually, by shifting the responsibility onto big, multinational corporations that already pay for local recycling programs in Canada, Europe, and dozens of other countries where EPR for Packaging has been implemented.

Maine's small businesses are an essential part of our economic future and are not responsible for the recycling challenges facing cities and towns. The EPR for Packaging bill being considered by Maine legislators was specifically crafted to protect local small businesses.

Any business that sells products in Maine that meets any one of the following exemptions **will not be affected** by the proposed EPR for Packaging law (values below are annual totals):

- Realized less than \$2,000,000 in total gross revenue; or
- Sold less than one ton of packaging material in total; or
- Realized a majority of gross revenue from the sale of goods acquired through insurance salvages, closeouts, bankruptcies, and liquidations.

The following types of packaging are exempt from the proposed EPR for Packaging law:

- Packaging used by nonprofit & governmental organizations
- Packages sold out of Maine
- Back of house packaging, not given/sold to customers
- Producers participating in Maine's PaintCare paint recycling program
- Bottles covered under the bottle deposit law
- Packaged goods used for donations
- Packages intended to be used as storage for 5 or more years (e.g., board game boxes)
- Reusable packaging

EPR for Packaging will require big corporations, which introduce the majority of the packaging that Maine taxpayers manage, to help pay for the recycling of their packaging. Under the EPR for Packaging proposal, a non-exempt "Producer" is a person who has legal ownership of a brand of a product sold in Maine that uses packaging. Only disposable packaging that goes home with the customer is covered.

- Examples of non-exempt brands: Amazon, Clorox, McDonald's, Walmart, Purdue Pharma
- Examples of non-exempt packaging: plastic tubs, cardboard boxes, plastic bags, and pouches
- Maine's larger businesses that aren't already exempt will fall into a flat fee category. Fees are low and based on the tonnage the brand introduces into the state's municipal waste stream.

Why Does Maine Need an EPR for Packaging Law?

- The patchwork of recycling programs has proven to be ineffective, confusing, and unsustainable. Taxpayers have paid for recycling for decades but have no control over the system to fix the problems for which they are paying.
- Corporations, like Amazon and Walmart, which design and introduce large amounts of packaging waste into our communities, have shown that they won't take action without incentives to reduce the waste our communities must manage.
- EPR is a proven solution that has been implemented all
 over the world. Most countries with EPR for Packaging see
 recycling rates well above 50%. Maine has had a goal of
 reaching a 50% recycling rate for 30 years, and we've never
 achieved it.
- Maine's economy and reputation rely upon a clean environment. Tourists come from around the globe to experience Maine's unique environment. The EPR for Packaging law helps ensure future generations will be able to continue to benefit from Maine's best asset; a clean environment.
